Village President Kevin Wallace has proclaimed the year 2019 “Bartlett Porch Proud.” Residents and businesses are encouraged to nominate their porches, gardens and landmark properties as inspiration for artists participating in this new community art initiative spearheaded by Arts in Bartlett with the Bartlett Historical Society and the Tri-Village Garden Club.

“Bartlett residents are rightfully proud of their well-maintained homes, charming porches and lovely gardens,” said artist and project chair Jenny Vogt. “During 2019, local and regional artists will be invited to capture these scenes in artwork created during all four seasons.”

Artists will be painting and selling art in the six gardens participating in this year’s Tri-Village Garden Club Walk on 7/13. Additional plans include a juried art exhibit with original art on sale at Arts in Bartlett’s gallery, 215 S. Main Street and the Bartlett Village Hall 2nd floor art gallery, 228 S. Main Street.

Notecards and postcards to promote the Village will be produced for the Global Arts Festival to be held on 6/22 and 6/23 and Bartlett Heritage Days, 9/6 to 9/8. The public also will be invited to vote for their 12 favorite “People’s Choice” artworks, which will be reproduced in a 2020 calendar.

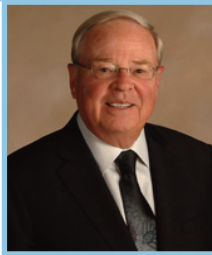

Timeout with the Trustees



This Board remains committed to pursuing and supporting new business development in the Village, which grows and diversifies the tax base and attracts new jobs. We are happy to report that this continuing effort reaped some rewards during 2018.

First and foremost, the Village's commercial vacancy rate was cut by more than half, going from approximately 16% to just 7.1%. Highlighting this positive trend is Amita Health Bartlett, now open in the long vacant former Dominick's space in the Stearns Crossing shopping center. South of there, Artis Senior Living completed and opened its new upscale 72-room memory care facility.

Some of the Village's other shopping centers welcomed new businesses as well. Bartlett's first Indian restaurant, Indian Express, opened in Westgate Commons along with Derick Dermatology. Oakfield Center on Lake Street, is now home to Bunge's Tire and Olivia's Place deli.

Along the Route 59 corridor, the Village saw the addition of Everwash car wash and Bartlett's second Starbuck's, which anchors the new center fronting Home Depot along with Great

Clips, Verizon, T Mobile and Doctors of Physical Therapy.

Balance Family Chiropractic relocated its 15-year-old Bartlett practice to a brand new building on Main Street, which signals the start of good things to come to the downtown in 2019.

The Village Board recently entered into a contract to sell the former Lucky Jack's site on Railroad Avenue to Bartlett residents Perry and Sunny Patel of MORE Brewing Company. The brothers plan to construct a brew pub with an eclectic menu and rooftop beer garden. Next door, a local entrepreneur is working on renovating and reopening the Bartlett Tap with a modern menu and drink selection.

Further east on Railroad Avenue, the Village has recently listed a 1.87-acre parcel with the goal of selling it to a multi-family residential developer. In keeping with Bartlett's TOD (transit oriented development) Plan, adding density in this area will help revitalize the downtown, making it even more attractive to restaurants, retail and other new and exciting businesses.

Did You Know?

...when Bartlett switches to Lake Michigan water in May, the transition will be seamless.

As of January, the receiving station and storage tank portion of the project was 30% complete and on track to meet the May 2019 target transition date. The DuPage Water Commission's 30-inch transmission main was installed; restoration work and flushing and chlorinating of the main is scheduled for April. Bartlett's Stearns Road and Villa Olivia transmission mains are in progress and on schedule.

When Bartlett does start pumping Lake Michigan water, Public Works will turn off the existing pumps simultaneously. The water towers and water mains will remain full of water, so there will not be any drop-off in pressure or loss of water. In other words, there won't be any sputtering at the faucet.

Water staff estimates that it will take three or four days to completely "turn over" the system, meaning the point at which all of the existing water in the system will be replaced by 100% Lake Michigan water. Residents immediately should notice that their water is softer.

FLOOD HAZARD AREAS

The Village of Bartlett has some floodplain areas. On the northwest side of town is the Brewster Creek Tributary. In the middle of town there is some floodplain in the Wayne Grove Forest Preserve. The northeastern part of the Village has the Brewster Creek floodplain, which flows to the West Branch of the DuPage River floodplain.

Information on whether your property is in the 100-year floodplain can be obtained by coming into the Village of Bartlett Building Department. Maps are available for viewing, as well as other flood-related information. Contact the Village of Bartlett Building Department, 630-837-0800 for further assistance.

NATURAL & BENEFICIAL FUNCTIONS

Floodplains play a valuable role in providing natural benefits to the Village of Bartlett and the surrounding area. Floodplains that are relatively undisturbed provide open spaces and aesthetic pleasure, as well as function for active processes, such as filtering nutrients.

Wayne Grove Forest Preserve and Hawk Hollow Forest Preserve floodplains are used to filter farm chemical run-off so that these areas can maintain biodiversity and ecosystem sustainability. Both floodplains contain historic and archeological sites that provide opportunity for education. Both enhance waterfowl, fish and other wildlife habitats and provide feeding/breeding grounds. And lastly, both floodplains provide natural erosion control and open space so further flooding damage does not occur.

FLASH FLOODS

Flash-flooding is the general type of flooding caused by heavy rain events. A flooding event can occur with 2 to 4 inches of rain in a 3 to 4 hour time period on some streets throughout the Village. Several detention areas may rise during these events. However, all of the Village streets are designed to additionally store stormwater for a period of time.

During spring and early summer, the Village can experience heavy rain events. It is not uncommon for water to stand in backyard/sideyard drainage areas for up to 48 hours. The Village has made several drainage improvements in problem areas in the last few years and is continually making improvements throughout the community.

DRAINAGE SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

As simple as it may sound, keeping smaller ditches and streams free of debris can dramatically improve the run-off capacity of low-lying areas and can greatly reduce the occurrence of blockage that significantly contributes to flooding.

It is illegal to dump materials into a required waterway and violators may be fined. If you see someone in the act of dumping or see debris in one of Bartlett's watercourses, please contact the Village Public Works Department at 630-837-0811.

Homeowners are responsible for maintaining their perimeter drainage swales. You may have a storm inlet in your yard; if you do, make sure to keep it clear of debris. If you have any flooding or drainage

concerns on your property, the Village of Bartlett staff is available to assess your drainage concerns. You can contact the Building Department at 630-837-0800.

PROPERTY PROTECTION MEASURES

If your property is susceptible to flooding, there are many flood damage reduction measures you can employ.

- Watertight seals can be applied to brick and block walls to protect against low-level flooding.
- Utilities, such as heating and air conditioning systems, water heaters and other major appliances can be elevated to higher floors in the structure or onto raised platforms.
- Temporary measures, such as moving furniture and other valuables to higher floors or sand-bagging exterior openings, will also help.
- Elevating or relocating the entire structure may also be a feasible option.

FLOODPLAIN PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

All development within the 100-year floodplain (not just construction of buildings, but filling, excavation, fences, etc.) requires a Village development permit. Applications must be made prior to doing any work in a floodplain area.

Please contact the Village Building Department, 630-837-0800, to receive all the information you need to properly develop in the floodplain. You may report any illegal development activities to the above number as well.

FLOOD INSURANCE

If you do not have flood insurance, talk to your agent.

Protection

Most homeowner insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. Flood insurance is only available to communities participating in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Because of Bartlett's floodplain management programs, which attempt to protect property owners from multiple flooding hazards, the Village is part of the NFIP. Bartlett residents are able to obtain flood insurance. Additionally, because the Village participates in FEMA's CRS program, flood insurance premiums are discounted.

Be sure to check your policy to ensure you have adequate coverage. Typical policies cover the building structure, but not the contents. Contents coverage can also be obtained by asking.

There is a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance coverage becomes effective. Plan ahead; do not wait until a flood is predicted before purchasing flood insurance. If you are building inside the floodplain and are using a federally regulated lender/bank for a loan, the purchase of flood insurance is mandatory.

SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT/DAMAGE

If the cost of improvements to a building or the cost to repair damages (from any cause) to a building exceeds 50% of the market value of the building (excluding land value), the NFIP requires that the entire building be brought up to current floodplain management standards. Building improvement projects include exterior and interior remodeling, rehabilitation, additions and repair and

reconstruction projects. Please contact the Village of Bartlett Building Department at 630-837-0800 for further information.

FLOOD WARNING SYSTEM

Many times, flooding of streets and parking lots in Bartlett can be predicted, allowing ample time for preparation and evacuation. However, in the event of a flash flood due to a large rain event, there may only be hours to execute a plan.

Once the Bartlett Police and Bartlett Fire Protection District are notified of an oncoming flood event, the Village's Emergency Alert System will be activated. The

Village can send a Code Red or mass emergency notification system alert to the entire Village or a specific neighborhood. Community alerts and additional safety information will also be posted to the Village website and cable television station.

FLOOD SAFETY

The following commonsense guidelines can protect you from the dangers of flooding:

- Do not drive through a flooded area. More people drown in cars than anywhere else. Do not drive around barriers.
- Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive. Six inches of water can knock you off your feet.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. If your house is about to be flooded, turn off the power at the service box. Electrical current can travel through water. Electrocutation is the second leading cause of death during floods.
- Be alert to gas leaks. Turn off the gas to your house before it floods. If you smell gas, report it to the Fire Protection District, the Village or your gas company. Do not use candles, lanterns or open flames if you smell gas or are unsure if your gas has been shut off.
- Keep children away from flood waters, ditches, culverts and storm drains. Flood waters can carry unimaginable items that have dislodged themselves. Culverts can suck in smaller people, rendering them helpless.
- Clean everything that has been wet. Flood water is contaminated with sewage and other chemicals, which pose severe health threats.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their home may seek shelter in yours.
- Do not use gas engines, such as generators, or charcoal fires indoors during power outages. Carbon monoxide exhaust can pose serious health hazards.

50/50 Parkway Tree Replacement Program

Through its long-running Parkway Tree Program, the Village of Bartlett, with the help of homeowners, has planted trees to reforest and diversify Bartlett's parkways. This 50/50 shared program provides the opportunity for residents to select and purchase a parkway tree, with the Village contributing 50 percent of the cost.

All trees available for order are 2-inches in diameter. The cost for residents per tree is \$100, which includes planting, mulching and a one-year warranty. Limited quantities of each species are available, and all orders are filled on a first-come, first-serve basis. Due to the need for tree diversification, the Village will not be planting any maple species this year.

You are only eligible to purchase a tree if you had a tree removed from your parkway or have the space for one to be planted. Planting is only done in the parkway, not on private property. Trees must be spaced 30 to 40 feet apart. Other restrictions, such as proximity to driveways, street lights, hydrants, storm sewers, etc. may occur. Final planting locations will be determined by the Village.

Public Works will begin taking orders on **February 25, 2019** for the spring planting season. Visit the Public Works page on the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us, on or after this date to see the available tree species and photos. Orders, with checks made payable to the Village of Bartlett, must be received by **April 19, 2019**. What you need to know...

Plants, Weeds, Grass, Vegetation & Native Plantings

The Village Board has approved some changes to the "Plants and Weeds" ordinance in order to strengthen the regulations for all lots and formalize the permit process for native plantings (indigenous grasses and wild flowers).

1. The ordinance was renamed to include "Plants, Weeds, Grass, Vegetation and Native Plantings" in the title.

2. Nuisances due to tall grass (taller than 8 inches in height) or weeds must now be abated within seven days of notice. Subsequent violations involving the same property within the same calendar year must now be abated within five days of notice.

3. "Native Planting Lots," which refers to privately owned lots planted with indigenous grasses or wild flowers (as opposed to a traditional lawn), are now allowed in the Village with certain restrictions. Property owners who wish to maintain such lots must obtain an initial permit from the Community Development Department and renew it annually. Native Planting Lots must be mowed or cut to a height of 18 inches or shorter before May 1 of each calendar year.

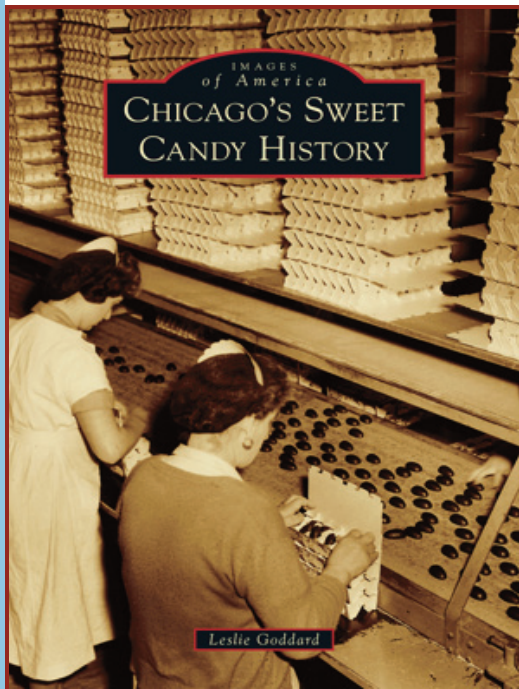

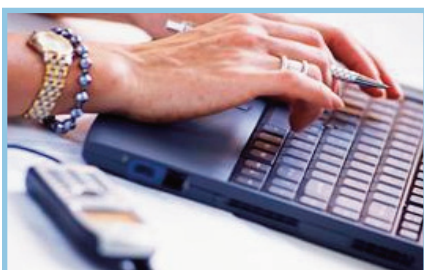
