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When a Community Cares...



“What if we, as a community, could help care for our neighbors in times of need? What if we could BETTER equip our police department to ‘serve with care?’ What if we could be a community that flourished on all levels?”

These are the questions you’ll see when you go to the new website for Bartlett Community Care Initiative (BCCI), a collaboration between the Village Church of Bartlett and the Bartlett Police Department to help provide for those in the community who find themselves in crisis or in a time of need. But BCCI doesn’t just ask these critical questions it is actively working to answer them.

Launched just this past summer, the initiative is already providing the “opportunity for the Police Department to interface with community needs” in a way that was previously unavailable. According to Sergeant Jessica Crowley, when officers respond to a call, they often find someone in an extreme circumstance that can’t be addressed with the routine resources in their Monday through Friday toolbox.

Village Church of Bartlett is a registered 501(c)(3) and BCCI is supported by a specific fund that the church wholly oversees and manages. Through this fund BCCI can equip Bartlett PD with: Uber rides for people who need to get to drug/alcohol treatment outside of the Village; hotel rooms for victims of violent crimes or domestic abuse; train rides to mental health services; meal or grocery gift cards

for someone weathering a trauma; service projects for Bartlett residents who need help and much more.

In addition to supporting Bartlett PD with resources, BCCI is connecting caring volunteers with their neighbors in need. On October 13, BCCI hosted its second serving project, going into a Bartlett neighborhood that required some extra help with maintenance. Dozens of volunteers provided their time and talents in a “Day of Service” to the community.

Also in the works is a web tool that persons struggling with addiction, mental illness, family/domestic issues or financial/home challenges can use to quickly and easily connect to the resources/services they need. By using large navigation buttons and simple questions, this web tool will remove some of the obstacles and stress that individuals often face when trying to advocate for themselves.

During these difficult times, when so many are struggling with needs and challenges like never before, Crowley called BCCI a true example of “the community giving back to the community.” She added that it was heartening to “partner with people that have so many different talents and want to give back.”

A Minute with the Mayor

Did you know that the next decennial census is just around the corner in 2020?

Every 10 years, the U.S. Census Bureau undertakes a mammoth task: counting all the people residing in the United States. Much more than just a head count, however, information from the census affects how our community plans for the future, the amount of funding we receive for vital programs and our representation in government.

Why An Accurate Count is Important

~ **It means \$675 billion** - census data determines how more than \$675 billion are spent, supporting our state, county and local Village programs. It also helps to ensure that services like Medicare, Medicaid, social security and public transportation can support those who need them.

~ **It's about redistricting** - after each census, state officials use the results to redraw the boundaries of congressional and state legislative districts, adapting to population shifts.

~ **It's about fair representation** - every 10 years the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.

~ **It informs community planning** - businesses use census data to decide where to build factories, offices and stores; real estate developers use census data to build new homes and revitalize neighborhoods; local taxing bodies use the information to build new schools, plan for public safety and for emergency preparedness.

~ **It's our civic duty to respond** - a census every 10 years is required by the U.S. Constitution. The first

census was in 1790 and it continues to be an important way for each of us to participate in our democracy and say "I Count!"

Why 2020 Will Be Easier than Ever to Be Counted

The 2020 census will be the first one in our country's history to primarily be completed online.

The U.S. Census will begin in March 2020 with Census Day to be observed on April 1, 2020. When it is time to respond (approximately mid-March), most households will receive an invitation in the mail. Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail or by phone. You can respond online or by phone in English or in 12 additional languages.

The Census Bureau will send reminder letters and/or postcards throughout March and April to households that have not yet responded and will followup in person to those who do not respond.

Responding is Safe

All of the information you share is protected by law and cannot be used against you. The Census Bureau will NEVER ask for: social security numbers; bank or credit card account numbers; money or donations; anything on behalf of a political party.

It is against the law for any Census Bureau employee to disclose or publish any census information that identifies an individual. In addition, no law enforcement agency (not the DHS, ICE, FBI or CIA) can access or use your personal information at any time. Data collected can only be used for statistical purposes that help inform important decisions for our community.

The Census Bureau has a "robust cybersecurity program that incorporates industry best practices and federal security standards for encrypting data."

The census counts every person living in the U.S. once, only once and in the right place. Please help ensure that you and your family members are counted in the Village of Bartlett by quickly responding to your census invitation.

Holiday Safety

The Bartlett Police Department offers these tips to help keep you safe this holiday season.

- ~Make arrangements to pick up packages delivered to your residence quickly to reduce delivery thefts.
- ~When shopping, deter pickpockets and



purse-snatchers by carrying a purse close to your body, not dangling by the straps. Put a wallet in an inside coat or front pants pocket and don't overburden yourself with packages.

- ~Do not leave valuables unattended while shopping.

- ~Lock your vehicle doors and remove gifts and personal belongings from your vehicle. Remember the old cliché "Out of sight, out of mind?" Anything left in plain view in your car may tempt a thief.
- ~Do not leave your vehicle running unattended with the keys in the ignition.
- ~Check devices for credit card readers by pulling on the reader before inserting your credit card.
- ~Don't fall for scams on false websites or emails requesting personal or credit card information to confirm purchases or regarding an undeliverable package. Try to confirm all requests directly with the company.
- ~Celebrate responsibly! Drinking and driving is a danger to everyone on the road. If you choose to drink alcohol at a party, don't drive. Take a cab, use public transportation, use a rideshare service or have a designated driver.
- ~Check on elderly neighbors during cold weather.
- ~Immediately report suspicious or criminal activity by dialing 9-1-1.

New Recreational Cannabis Law

According to Illinois' new Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, starting January 1, adults age 21 years and older will be able to legally purchase cannabis (marijuana) for recreational use from licensed dispensaries across the state.

Possession limits for Illinois residents under the new law are: 30 grams of cannabis flower; 5 grams of cannabis concentrate; and no more than 500 milligrams of THC contained in a cannabis-infused product, such as an edible.

Registered patients in the medical cannabis pilot program may possess more than 30 grams of cannabis if it is grown and secured in their residence under certain conditions. Non-patients are NOT allowed to grow marijuana at home for recreational use.

It will be legal to smoke/use cannabis recreationally in one's own home, but if you are a renter, your landlord can ban smoking inside your apartment. Use is prohibited in any public place, such as streets or parks; anywhere near someone younger than the age of 21; and in any motor vehicle.

Illinois already has a law on the books that makes drivers with THC blood concentration of five nanograms or more per milliliter guilty of driving under the influence, regardless of whether the driver is impaired. The new law creates a DUI Task Force led by Illinois State Police to examine best practices for roadside testing, including examining emerging technology in this area.

Please be aware that nothing in the new cannabis act prohibits employers from adopting reasonable zero tolerance or drug-free workplace policies or employment policies concerning drug testing, smoking, consumption, storage or use of cannabis in the workplace or while on call, provided that the policy is applied in a nondiscriminatory manner. Also nothing in the act limits or prevents an employer from disciplining an employee or terminating employment of an individual for violating an employer's employment policies or workplace drug policy.

Be a Hydrant Hero - Volunteer to Keep It Clear

The Village of Bartlett with the Bartlett Fire Protection District is launching a new safety program and needs your help! In the winter months heavy snowfall often buries fire hydrants, making it difficult for firefighters to locate and access them during an emergency, when every second counts! The Village and Fire Protection District is asking residents and other community members to sign up and adopt a hydrant to help keep Bartlett safe.

Participation in the Adopt-A-Hydrant program involves:

- ~ making sure the adopted fire hydrant is clearly visible from the street
- ~ keeping the fire hydrant free of snow and ice with clearances of at least three (3) feet all around the hydrant.
- ~ keeping the hydrant free of grass, weeds and debris with clearances of at least three (3) feet all around the hydrant.

How to Adopt

1. Visit the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us, and find the Adopt-a-Hydrant webpage link under the "Residents" navigation tab on the homepage.
2. You will be asked to enter an email address into the sign-up field and then fill in your name, etc.
3. Once signed up, you will receive a login link via email. Click the link to access the Adopt-a-Hydrant interactive map.
4. Next, select a hydrant close to your home or business for convenience. If you like, you can name your hydrant. Have fun with this, but please be appropriate and respectful!
5. After you name your hydrant, hit the "adopt" button.

Throughout your participation in the program, adopters are encouraged to use the Adopt-A-Hydrant application (map) to submit a photo of your hydrant, report an issue with your hydrant and report whenever you have cleared your hydrant after a snowfall. If you decide you no longer want to participate in the program, simply sign in to the application and select "abandon hydrant."



When shoveling a fire hydrant, remember the "3 rules for 3 feet":

- 1. Access:** When the fire district uses a hydrant, the "hydrant person" grabs the bag with tools, adapters and a large supply hose that will get the water to the pumper. Having clear access to the hydrant reduces the time spent locating a buried hydrant or digging to get enough room to work.
- 2. Room to Work:** When attaching adapters and "charging" or turning on the hydrant, tools have a tendency to fall and/or get lost in the snow. Three feet of clearance in all directions provides sufficient room for the firefighter to connect to the hydrant without losing equipment in the snow.
- 3. Safety:** You may ask, "Why do I need to shovel the back of the hydrant?" When "charging" or turning on the hydrant, for safety reasons, the hydrant person **MUST** stand behind the hydrant. The hydrant person **MUST NEVER** stand in front of the hydrant or to the side of the hydrant. If a hydrant cap, coupling or adapter is not securely affixed or becomes damaged, the water pressure could blow the cap, coupling or adapter off, causing injury to the hydrant person. Once again, having complete clearance around the hydrant (front, both sides and **BACK**) is vital for proper and safe operations.

Your Safety is Important!

Please **ONLY** shovel your hydrant if the conditions are safe to do so. You should be sure that you are completely visible and not in danger of being struck by a passing vehicle when working near the roadway. Also be sure that you are physically able to clear the hydrant. You should **NEVER** put your safety or health in jeopardy when shoveling the hydrants.

Winter Golf - Indoors and Out

The simulator is available by appointment Monday through Saturday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday from 8 a.m. to noon. Evenings are available but must be booked 48 hours in advance. Please call Bartlett Hills, 630-847-2741.

Cost to use the simulator is \$35 per hour (NOT PER PERSON). Seniors older than 60 play for \$30 per hour Monday through Friday. The bar will be open with drinks and a limited menu available during simulator hours.

Diehard golfers can grab their hats, gloves and clubs and prepare to tee off outside, even during

the winter season. Bartlett Hills offers winter golf using regular greens, December through February, when the weather and ground conditions are appropriate.

Golf Shop Hours

Golf shop hours through Christmas will be Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Sunday from 9 a.m. to noon. These are the minimum hours the golf shop will be open, but hours may be extended if golfers are on the course or the simulator is being used.

Snow? Plows are Ready!

Freezing temperatures, snow and ice are the winter norm for this area, and Bartlett Public Works salt trucks and snowplows are ready.

Bartlett streets are plowed in the following order: main streets, secondary collector streets, cul-de-sacs and dead-end streets. Priority is given to the most heavily traveled streets. Visit PW - Streets Division on the Village website to see a jurisdictional street map.

Parking on Village streets is prohibited after 2 inches of snow has fallen to allow plows to completely clear the roadways. It's a good idea to wait until after the final pass of the plow to shovel the end of your driveway.

DO NOT shovel snow into the street. It violates Village code, can cause ice patches and can potentially result in serious accidents.

The Village clears snow from sidewalks surrounding public buildings and the commuter areas. The Village does not clear neighborhood sidewalks.



Please be a snow angel and shovel your sidewalk so school children and pedestrians can walk with greater ease and safety. Please call Public Works, 630-837-0811, if you have any snow removal questions.

Groot Tree Collection & January Rate Increase

Groot collects holiday trees at no additional charge on the regular pickup day for a three-week period following Christmas. Place your tree on the curb with your regular garbage and recycling. All ornaments and tinsel must be removed from the tree. **Do not place the tree in a plastic bag.** Trees that have decorations or that are put out for disposal after this time period will be picked up but not recycled.

As a reminder, Groot's regular weekly waste pickup day is Tuesday. However garbage is not collected on the following holidays: **New Years Day; Memorial Day; Independence Day; Labor Day; Thanksgiving; Christmas.** If one of these holidays falls on a Sunday, Monday, or Tuesday, collection will be on Wednesday during that week only.



On January 1, 2020, Bartlett is starting its third year of a five-year contract with waste hauler Groot Industries. The new 2020 single family home rate will be \$20.36 per month; the 2020 multi-family unit rate will be \$18.43 per month. All charges for residential refuse and recycling collection are billed quarterly by Groot.

Senior citizens, age 65 and older, are eligible to receive a 10% discount off their monthly service rate. Please contact Groot, 847-429-7370, to learn more about the senior discount or if you have additional questions about waste collection services.

The cost of yard waste stickers for 2020 will increase from \$2.75 to \$3 per sticker. Yard rakings, grass clippings, garden material and small twigs are considered yard waste, which is collected April through November by Groot. Residents can use generic yard waste bags with Groot stickers applied. Bartlett Village Hall, Ace Hardware, Jewel and Walgreens on Rt. 59 and Stearns carry the yard waste stickers. During October and November residents can put leaves only into generic bags and they do not need a sticker to be collected.

Did You Know?

... you should NEVER pour hot grease down any interior drain or storm drain. During the holiday season many large family meals will be cooked, and with them, a large amount of grease and oil will be created. The Village reminds residents and business owners that grease and oil must be disposed of properly.

Grease and oil solidifies once it cools and can cause damage to interior plumbing and Village sewers. It also can cause sewer backups into your home. If grease is dumped into the Village's storm sewer, rainfall will not be able to drain properly and can cause flooding. Additionally, the Village has separate storm and sanitary sewer systems, so anything that goes into the storm sewer system goes into ponds, creeks and local rivers and is not treated by the wastewater treatment plant.

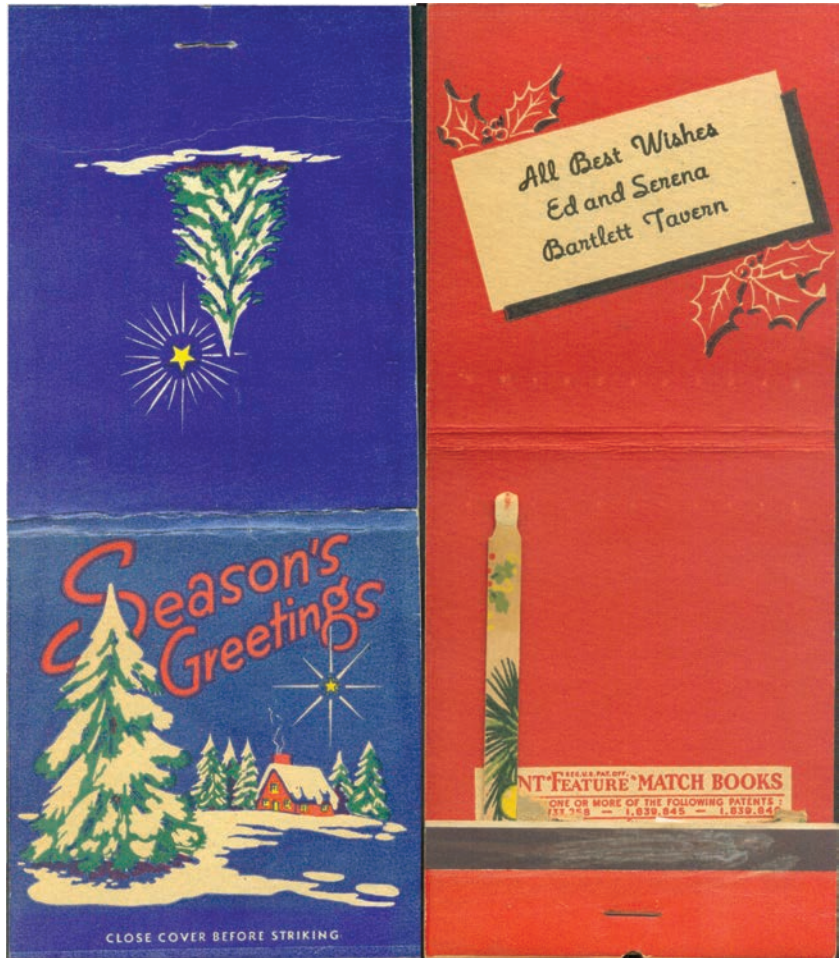
