Tuesday, April 6, 2021 is the consolidated election in Illinois. Political signs (not to be posted longer than 90 days) are governed the same as all temporary signs under the Village of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance.... "No temporary sign may be posted on any trees or public appurtenances such as light poles, traffic lights, utility poles, street signs, fire hydrants, etc., nor shall any such sign be located within, upon or projecting over any public right of way or public property."



Is solar right for your home? In May 2019, the Village of Bartlett earned a SolSmart Gold designation for its work to improve solar market conditions, making it faster, easier and more affordable for residents and businesses to install solar energy systems. The Village issued 42 solar permits in 2020.

Bartlett's largest installation of solar panels is at Home Depot (shown above) with more than 600 solar modules/arrays installed. The store's solar permit was issued on 8/16/19 and the final inspection was approved on 1/3/2020.

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Meeting Needs Through Community

Bartlett Community Care Initiative began in 2019 as a partnership between the Village Church of Bartlett and the Bartlett Police Department to meet needs for mental health, physical well being and emergency situations in the community.

Although the program, now relaunched as Bartlett Community Care Collective (BC3) and expanded to other local communities, has only been in place for about 16 months, it has proven to be successful in providing Bartlett Police Department members with resources that otherwise would not have been available.

The following are examples of items, funded through donations, that officers were able to utilize in order to help those in need:

- a cellphone with an Uber app to provide to those who don't have the ability to get transportation to a mental health/addiction treatment facility
- meal gift cards
- gas gift cards
- Metra train passes
- free-standing phone charging station placed in the police department lobby
- Samsung tablet with a mental health resource app for reference

Volunteer Locally - Neighbors Helping Neighbors

Since its inception, BC3 has organized both community-wide volunteer opportunities, such as days of service, blood drives and food drives, and individual partnerships to help with tasks like regular yardwork, ongoing food needs and in-home visits.

Provide Support - Equipping Police

The BC3 partnership allows the community to directly support the police department on the ground

with tangible needs. This includes rides to and from rehabilitation programs, a safe place to stay for a domestic abuse victim or even a safe place to charge a phone.

In September 2020, DuPage County Chiefs of Police Association selected Bartlett Community Care Initiative to receive the Pioneer Policing Award, which is presented to totally innovative programs, policies, or technology not knowingly used elsewhere.



Find Help - Providing Next Steps

BC3 provides a simple way for anyone in the community who has mental, physical or other needs to find help. The goal is to be a resource and a hub for information for those who need assistance to take their next steps. The BC3 website is a great place to start for people who don't know what to do next.

Did You Know?

... Bartlett Police Department uses the 911 phone system to dispatch officers to ALL calls for service, whether they are emergency or non-emergency calls. When a police, fire or medical emergency arises or if you want to report a non-emergency incident such as, but not limited to, a theft, stray dog, traffic accident, lockout to a motor vehicle, identity theft, neighbor dispute or noise complaint, please call 911 and a specially-trained dispatcher will dispatch a police officer or a community service officer.

DO NOT call the police department's main telephone number, 630-837-0846, if you have an emergency or a non-emergency request for police service because the records clerk will have to transfer your call to the 911 phone system. This can take valuable time if there is an emergency situation.

The police department's main telephone number should only be used if you need to follow up with a department member, have a question about a police report or a FOIA request, want to schedule a child safety seat installation or for overnight parking permission.

Take Five with the Trustees

If there was ever a year that begged us to look for silver linings, it was 2020. As this Board prepares for the next fiscal year (beginning May 1), we reviewed our strategic goals and recent accomplishments and were encouraged by the many positive indicators that our community can build upon.

The commercial vacancy rate, which stood at 19% in February of 2016, has declined steadily to 6%. We have been focused on decreasing the vacancy rate for commercial spaces, facilitated the implementation of the Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Plan and focused on marketing the Village for developments in all areas.

In downtown Bartlett, the biggest redevelopment project in many years is nearing completion at the former Bartlett Plaza, now rebranded as Streets of Bartlett. The shopping center's new owner completed in excess of \$2 million worth of improvements. Businesses that have opened in the center include Armanetti Beverage Mart; One Taco Dos Tequilas; Cherry on Top ice cream shoppe; Lucky's Barber Shop; Magnolia wedding and event venue; WOW-CBD store; and the relocated cafe, d'licious. Still to come - Hoot Dogs, a bowling alley called Midway Lanes and O'Hare's Pub in its new space.

Brewster Creek Business Park continues to serve as the primary growth engine for Bartlett's economy. The business park is now home to approximately 75 businesses housed in 44 buildings, which collectively employ more than 4,000 employees in jobs ranging from light manufacturing to high-tech research to food production and distribution. Nearly 80% of the park's 468 development acres are occupied.

In August 2019, the Village was able to attract the first major project to the Cook County portion of the Brewster Creek Business Park. McKesson Surgical gained Village Board approval to construct a 400,000 square foot warehouse/distribution/office facility that will initially bring 70 new employees and

eventually as many as 200. The building should be completed and online by the third quarter of 2021.

Conor Globe Commercial has approval for a 436,000 square foot speculative building on a 24.8-acre lot in the Cook County portion of the business park. It will be the largest building in the village. During 2020, several smaller build-to-suit projects were also approved in the DuPage County portion and are in various stages of completion.

The 300-plus acre Bluff City Industrial Park is home to heavy industrial uses including Vulcan Materials underground limestone mine, Allied Asphalt, AOS Liquid Asphalt and Welch Brothers concrete products.

Additional redevelopment is underway for the Southwind Business Park. Traffic Services Inc. (TSI) is completing its 11,500 square foot expansion; Cathay Industries purchased a site and completed its 102,000 square foot building; and Parkland Prep Academy, a private therapeutic day school in a new 20,800 square foot building, has opened. Great Lakes Landscaping is also relocating to Blue Heron Business Park and is in the process of building a 35,500 square foot facility.

The six acres at the southeast corner of Route 25 and West Bartlett Road had been targeted for commercial development since the Blue Heron Business Park was created. This past September, True North gained Village Board approval to construct the first truck stop in Bartlett. The new development will consist of a 5,000 square foot convenience store with eight pump islands (16 total stations) for passenger vehicles and 4 pump stations for diesel trucks on a 3.28-acre site.

With a brand new Culver's, 1430 IL Rte 59, now open, a few residential projects in the works and the potential development of high-end apartments and a possible grocery store at Route 59 and Lake Street, the glass appears to be more than half full for Bartlett at the start of 2021.

Flood

FLOOD HAZARD AREAS

The Village of Bartlett has some floodplain areas. On the northwest side of town is the Brewster Creek Tributary. In the middle of town there is some floodplain in the Wayne Grove Forest Preserve. The northeastern part of the Village has the Brewster Creek floodplain, which flows to the West Branch of the DuPage River floodplain.

NATURAL & BENEFICIAL FUNCTIONS

Floodplains play a valuable role in providing natural benefits to the Village of Bartlett and the surrounding area. Floodplains that are relatively undisturbed provide open spaces and aesthetic pleasure, as well as function for active processes, such as filtering nutrients.

Wayne Grove Forest Preserve and Hawk Hollow Forest Preserve floodplains are used to filter farm chemical run-off so that these areas can maintain biodiversity and ecosystem sustainability. Both floodplains contain historic and archaeological sites that provide opportunity for education. Both enhance waterfowl, fish and other wildlife habitats and provide feeding/breeding grounds. And lastly, both floodplains provide natural erosion control and open space so further flooding damage does not occur.

FLASH FLOODS

Flash-flooding is the general type of flooding caused by heavy rain events. A flooding event can occur with 2 to 4 inches of rain in a 3 to 4 hour time period on some streets throughout the Village.

Several detention areas may rise during these events. However, all of the Village streets are designed to additionally store stormwater for a period of time.

During spring and early summer, the Village can experience heavy rain events. It is not uncommon for water to stand in backyard/sideyard drainage areas for up to 48 hours. The Village has made several drainage improvements in problem areas in the last few years and is continually making improvements throughout the community.

DRAINAGE SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

As simple as it may sound, keeping smaller ditches and streams free of debris can dramatically improve the run-off capacity of low-lying areas and can greatly reduce the occurrence of blockage that significantly contributes to flooding.

It is illegal to dump materials into a required waterway and violators may be fined. If you see someone in the act of dumping or see debris in one of Bartlett's watercourses, please contact the Village Public Works Department at 630-837-0811.

Homeowners are responsible for maintaining their perimeter drainage swales. You may have a storm inlet in your yard; if you do, make sure to keep it clear of debris. If you have any flooding or drainage concerns on your property, the Village of Bartlett staff is available to assess your drainage issue. You can report a concern by accessing

the **GORequest system using the "Stay Connected" link** on the homepage of the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us or use the **"How Do I" drop down navigation** tab on the website and look for **"Report a problem or concern."** In addition, Bartlett's **GORequest app** is available on your smartphone or tablet.

PROPERTY PROTECTION MEASURES

If your property is susceptible to flooding, there are many flood damage reduction measures you can employ.

- Watertight seals can be applied to brick and block walls to protect against low-level flooding.
- Utilities, such as heating and air conditioning systems, water heaters and other major appliances can be elevated to higher floors in the structure or onto raised platforms.
- Temporary measures, such as moving furniture and other valuables to higher floors or sandbagging exterior openings, will also help.
- Elevating or relocating the entire structure may also be a feasible option.

FLOODPLAIN PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

All development within the 100-year floodplain (not just construction of buildings, but filling, excavation, fences, etc.) requires a Village development permit. Applications must be made prior to doing any work in a floodplain area.

the floodplain. You may report any illegal development activities to the above number as well.

FLOOD INSURANCE

If you do not have flood insurance, talk to your agent. Most homeowner insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. Flood insurance is only available to communities participating in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Because of Bartlett's floodplain management programs, which attempt to protect property owners from multiple flooding hazards, the Village is part of the NFIP. Bartlett residents are able to obtain flood insurance. Additionally, because the Village participates in FEMA's CRS program, flood insurance premiums are discounted.

Be sure to check your policy to ensure you have adequate coverage. Typical policies cover the building structure, but not the contents. Contents coverage can also be obtained by asking.

There is a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance coverage becomes effective. Plan ahead; do not wait until a flood is predicted before purchasing flood insurance. If you are building inside the floodplain and are using a federally regulated lender/bank for a loan, the purchase of flood insurance is mandatory.

SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT/DAMAGE

If the cost of improvements to a building or the cost to repair damages (from any cause) to a building exceeds 50% of the market value of the building (excluding land value), the NFIP

requires that the entire building be brought up to current floodplain management standards. Building improvement projects include exterior and interior remodeling, rehabilitation, additions and repair and reconstruction projects. FLOOD WARNING SYSTEM

Many times, flooding of streets and parking lots can be predicted, allowing ample time for preparation and evacuation. However, in the event of flash flood due to a large rain event, there may only be hours to execute a plan.

Once the Bartlett Police and Bartlett Fire Protection District

are notified of an oncoming flood event, the Village's Emergency Alert System will be activated. The Village can send a Code Red or mass emergency notification system alert to the entire Village or a specific neighborhood. Community alerts and additional safety information will also be posted to the Village website.

FLOOD SAFETY TIPS

- Do not drive through a flooded area or around protection barriers. More people drown in cars than anywhere else.
- Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive. Six inches of water can knock you off your feet.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. If your house is about to be flooded, turn off the power at the service box. Electrical current can travel through water. Electrocuting is the second leading cause of death during floods.
- Be alert to gas leaks. Turn off the gas to your house before it floods. If you smell gas, report it to the Fire Protection District, the Village or your gas company. Do not use candles, lanterns or open flames if you smell gas or are unsure if your gas has been shut off.
- Keep children away from flood waters, ditches, culverts and storm drains. Flood waters can carry unimaginable items that have dislodged themselves. Culverts can suck in smaller people, making them helpless.
- Clean everything that has been wet. Flood water is contaminated with sewage and other chemicals, which pose severe health threats.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their home may seek shelter in yours.
- Do not use gas engines, such as generators, or charcoal fires indoors during power outages. Carbon monoxide exhaust can pose serious health hazards.

50/50 Parkway Tree Replacement Program



Through its long-running Parkway Tree Program, the Village of Bartlett has planted trees with the help of homeowners in an effort to reforest and diversify Bartlett's parkways. This 50/50 shared program provides the opportunity for residents to select and purchase a parkway tree, with the Village sharing in 50 percent of the cost.

All trees available for order are 2 inches in diameter. The cost for residents per tree is \$100, which includes planting, mulching and a one-year warranty. Limited quantities of each species are available, and all orders are filled on a first-come, first served basis.

You are only eligible to purchase a tree if you had a tree removed from your parkway or have the space for one to be planted. Planting is only done in the parkway, not on private property. Trees must be spaced 30 to 40 feet apart. Other restrictions, such as proximity to driveways, street lights, hydrants, storm sewers, etc. may occur. Final planting locations will be determined by the Village.

Public Works will begin taking orders on **February 22, 2021** for the spring planting season. Visit the Public Works page on the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us, on or after this date to see the available tree species, photos and order form. Orders, with checks made payable to the Village of Bartlett, must be received by April 23, 2021. More PW Cost Sharing Programs

With the increase in aging infrastructure in Bartlett, it may become necessary for residents to improve or replace their private water and sewer lines. To assist in these projects, the Village offers cost sharing programs to help ease the financial burden on residents. The Village programs can be a more economical alternative to commercially available insurance for private sewer/water lines and other utilities. Lateral Sewer Lining Program:

Older residential homes and older sanitary sewer mains were built out of Vitrified Clay Pipe (VCP). Due to shifting ground and the age of some of these pipes, tree roots can break through and other cracks can form in the pipe causing leaks and potential backups into the home. To help prevent this, the Village annually provides a cost sharing program to line the residential service from the main to the home.

Lead Service Line Replacement Program:

Although uncommon, a portion of older homes in the Village were constructed with lead water service lines from the shutoff valve to the home. Although Bartlett's source water is lead-free, lead from the lead water service can leach into the water and cause elevated lead levels. To combat this, the Village is providing a cost sharing program to replace the lead water service line with a copper service from the shut-off valve to the water meter.

Overhead Sewer Program:

Bartlett's Overhead Sewer Program was established to provide financial assistance to homeowners who want to protect their home from flooding during a heavy rain event. Typically, homes which have experienced sewer back-ups and flooded basements during a heavy rain event have a gravity type sewer. The existing sewer underneath the basement floor drains to the sewer in the street by gravity. When the Village sanitary sewers become overloaded due to the rain, the gravity type sewer is subject to back-up. Changing the basement plumbing system to an Overhead Sewer can protect the basement from back-ups.

John Deere: the History & Future of Agriculture

You are invited to a private board meeting and celebration of John Deere & Co. on Tuesday, 2/23 at 7 p.m. via Zoom. Company founder John Deere is retiring and handing the plow to his son Charles.

As John Deere, historian and author Brian "Fox" Ellis reflects on the history of his self-scouring plows, shares some of his personal struggles and then turns to the great changes and future in farming that he foresees for his son.

Ellis covers a hundred years of agricultural history and then leads a discussion on what is yet to come. Raising issues like the pros and cons of agriculture versus agribusiness, the role of technology and mechanization, the small family farm, centennial farms and community service agriculture, this program promises to engage the audience in a complex conversation on how we continue to feed the world.

Turning the old Q and A session on its head, a large portion of the program is John Deere asking the audience questions about their family roots in agriculture and where they think the future will lead us.

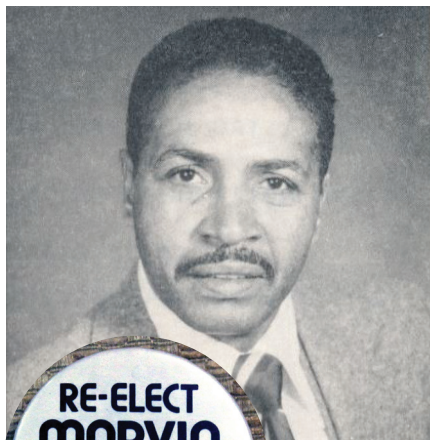

Share Your Stories

February is African American History Month, and the Bartlett History Museum is sharing the story of onetime resident Marvin E. White Jr. This Air Force veteran and owner of a dental laboratory moved to Bartlett in 1972 with his wife Maria. His service to Bartlett began with his appointment to the Industrial Commission and the Plan Commission.



In 1981, White ran and was elected to the Bartlett Village Board beginning his eight-year tenure as a trustee. He was initially chairperson of the Police & Health Committee and later served on the Finance & Personnel Committee. White ran for a third term in 1989 but lost. He was the first, and to date, the only person of color elected to serve on the Village Board.

BREAD BAKING Q & A
